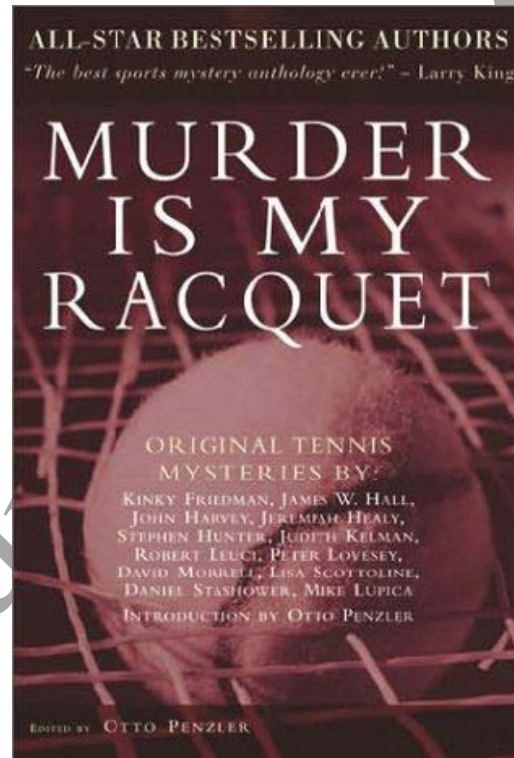

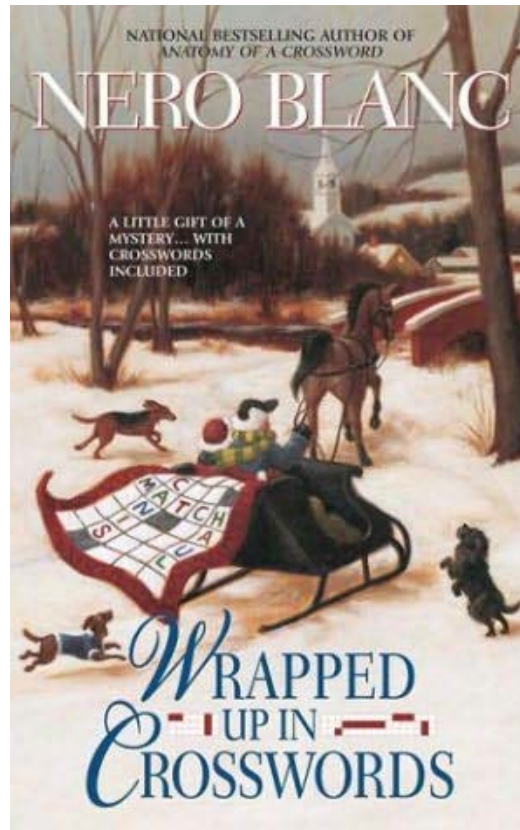
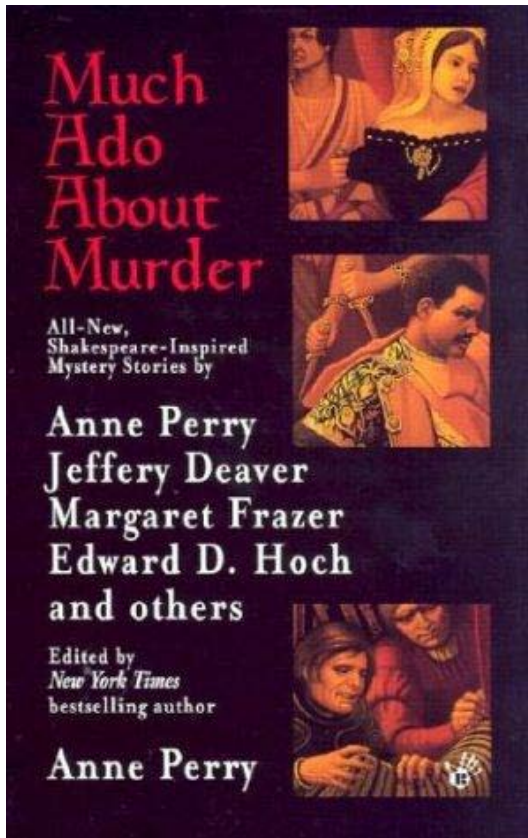

With that in mind, here are a few suggestions, running the gamut from fireside cozies to gritty police procedurals to intriguing history-with-mysteries. You might just want to stuff your own stocking, and if you do, who's to know?

Short Stories

As the owner of the Mysterious Bookshop in New York City, the founder and editor of the Mysterious Press, and mentor to many contemporary crime writers, **Otto Penzler** is the Doyen of American crime writing. For this anthology of fourteen tennis tales, aptly titled *Murder is My Racquet*, Otto has assembled a collection of stories by such established writers as Peter Lovesey, Jeremiah Healy, Lisa Scottoline, and Lawrence Sanders. 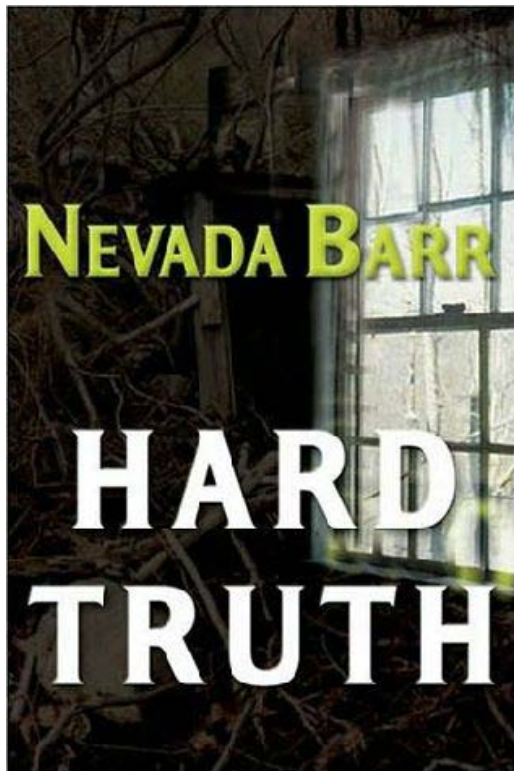

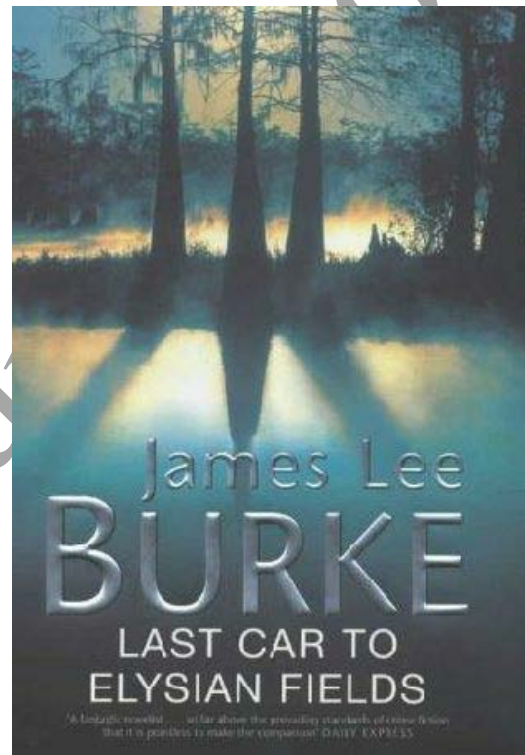


Our American Friends

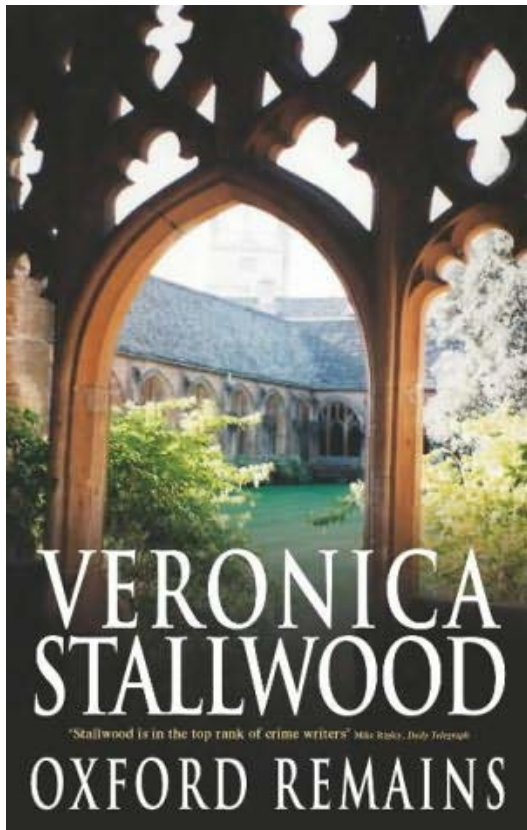
Anna Pigeon is newly assigned as the first woman ranger in the Rocky Mountains National Park. On only her second day on the job she must deal with missing girls and a rural commune housing an ominous sect. An edge-of-your-seat thriller, with multiple plot twists amid a setting both beautiful and terrifying. *Hard Truth* is the latest in the Anna Pigeon series by noted writer **Nevada Barr**, herself a former park ranger (*Hard Truth*, NY, Putnam, 2005)



Robicheaux leaves his home in New Iberia and heads for New Orleans when he learns that an old friend, Catholic priest Jimmie Dolan, has been savagely assaulted. He juggles his inquiry into that case, with the murder of a liquor-store owner in New Iberia, and a cold case involving the disappearance, decades earlier, of a legendary blues musician. Offering full value for money, this gritty, multi-layered work is among Burke's best. (*Last Car to Elysian Fields*, NY, Simon & Schuster, 2003)

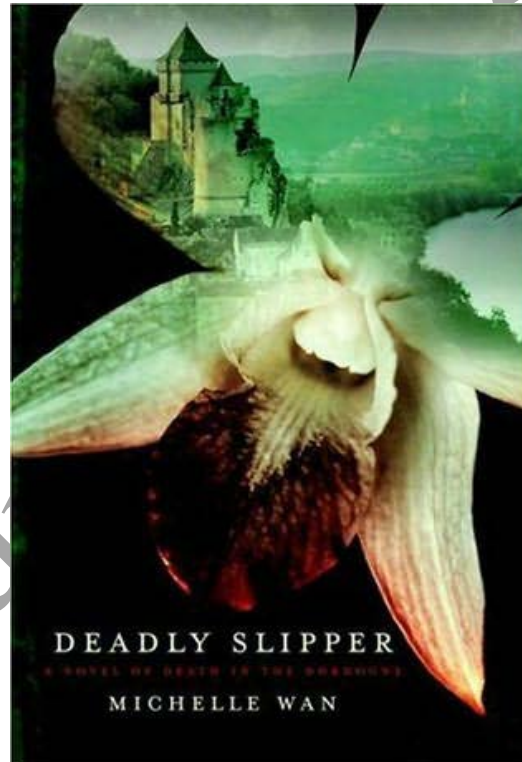
Best of British

Murder in Oxford: think Inspector Morse, right? Well, not entirely: among the many writers who have turned their hand to skullduggery in the City of Spires, **Veronica Stallwood** has made a name for herself, with more than a dozen such works to her credit. In *Oxford Remains*, her 11th in the series, protagonist Kate Ivory is called in when Daisy Tompkins, a second-year student at Bartlesmas College complains to the Dean about her tutor, Joseph Fechan, and the Dean feels she cannot objectively investigate a close friend. When Daisy turns up dead, suspicion naturally falls on Fechan, but in the world of mystery fiction things are never that simple, right? (*Oxford Remains*, London, Headline, 2004)

Canadian Capers

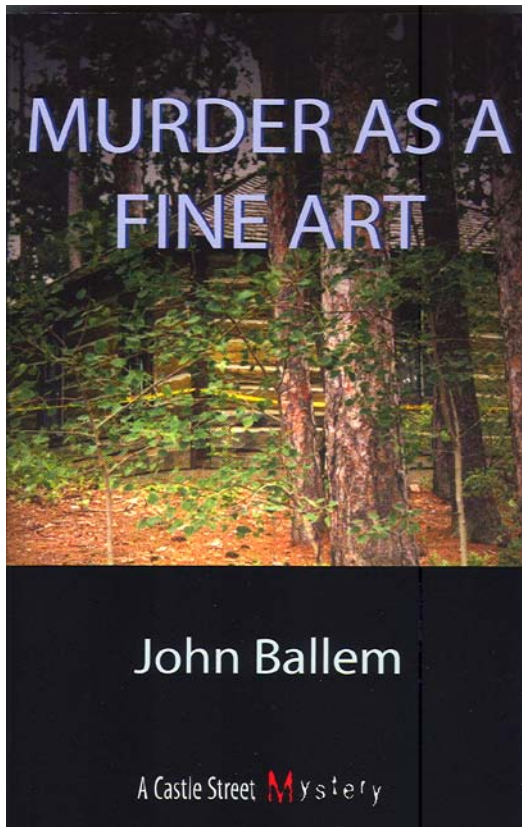
Set in Canada and France by Ontario author **Michelle Wan**, *Deadly Slipper* is

a tale of death in the Dordogne. In 1984, Mara Dunn's twin sister, Bedie, disappeared while on a hiking holiday in southwestern France with her boyfriend. Two decades later Mara has moved to France, determined to solve the mystery surrounding her sister's disappearance—her only clue a photo of some flowers. (*Deadly Slipper*, NY, Doubleday, 2005)

Alberta writer and lawyer **John Ballem**'s eleventh novel is set in the Canadian Rockies, at the Banff Centre for the Arts. When playwright Alan Montrose is found dead, it is considered an accident; but when a second artist is burned to death in her studio, the other members of the colony come under serious scrutiny. An absorbing and cautionary tale that is as much about the human species as it is about a collection of artists and writers. (*Murder as a Fine Art*, Toronto, Castle Street Mysteries, 2002)
